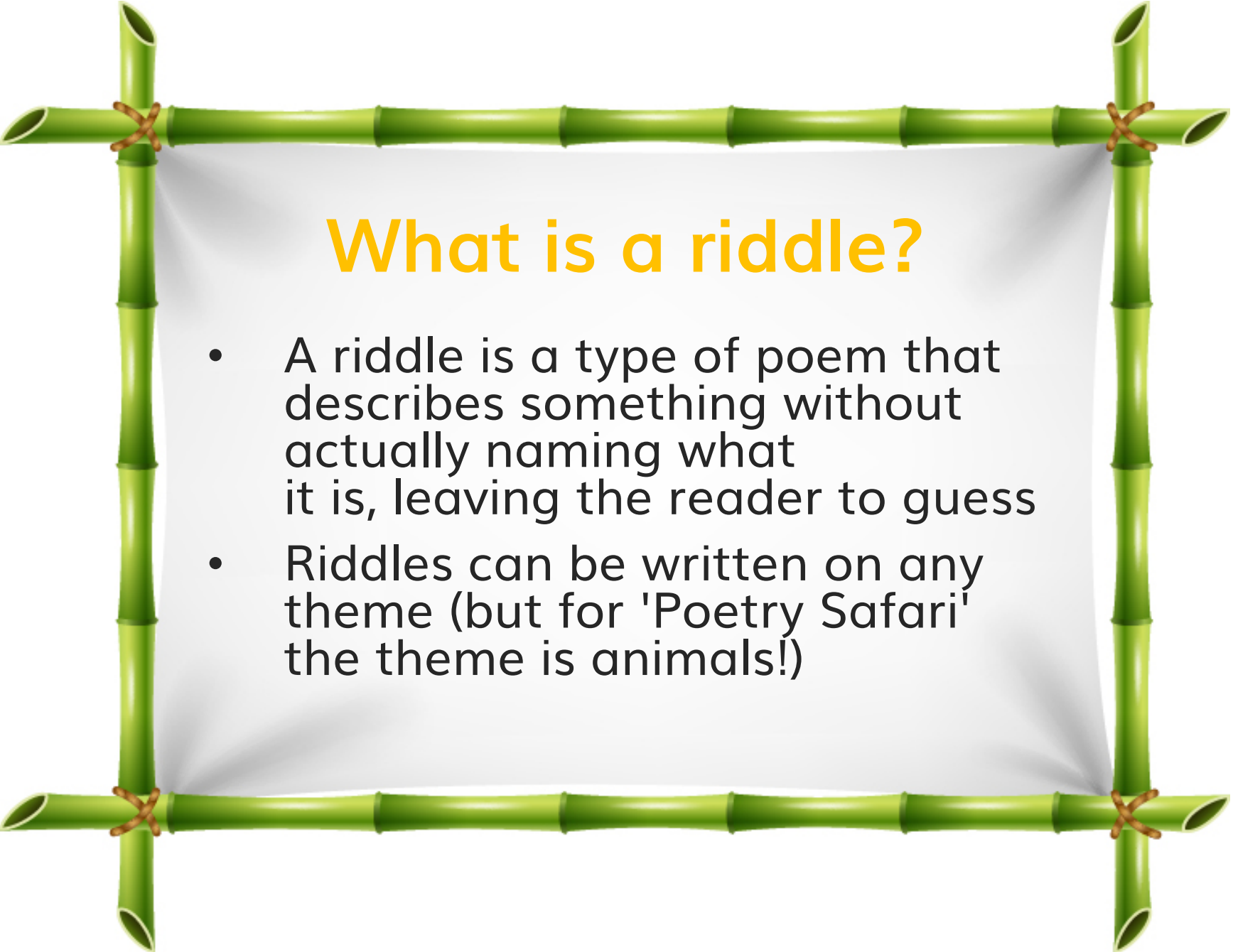

Riddle



Today you are going to:

- Learn what a riddle is
- Write descriptively about an animal
- Expand vocabulary
- Plan, draft and write a poem for 'Poetry Safari'



What is a riddle?

- A riddle is a type of poem that describes something without actually naming what it is, leaving the reader to guess
- Riddles can be written on any theme (but for 'Poetry Safari' the theme is animals!)

How to write a riddle

You have to describe the animal as other things, such as:

- a colour
- a person
- a food
- a season
- a feeling
- a place



Planning your riddle

You can write about any animal you like:

- your pet
- a pet you wish you had
- a wild animal
- a mythical creature
- a crazy creature from your imagination

Or your teacher may give you an animal to write about.

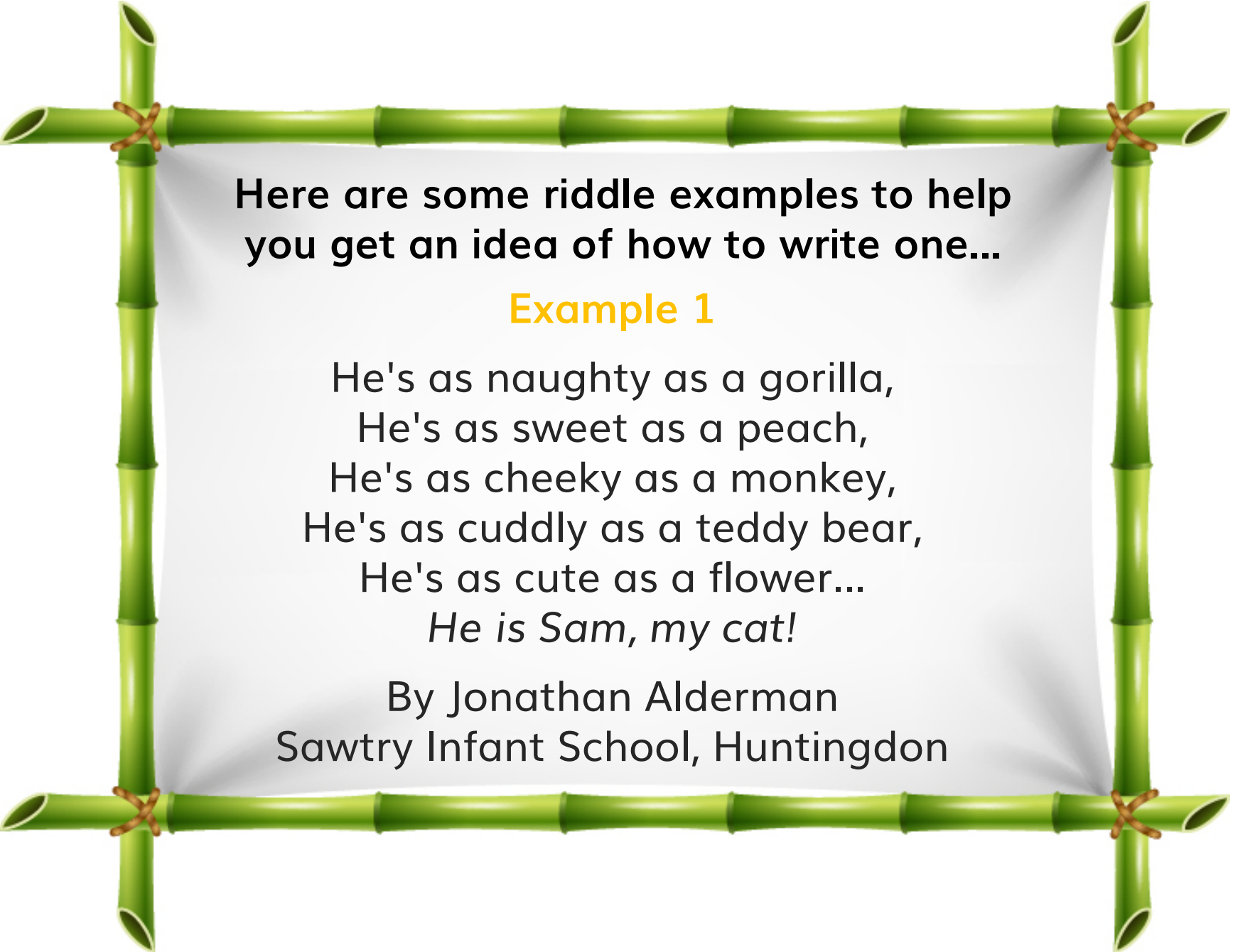

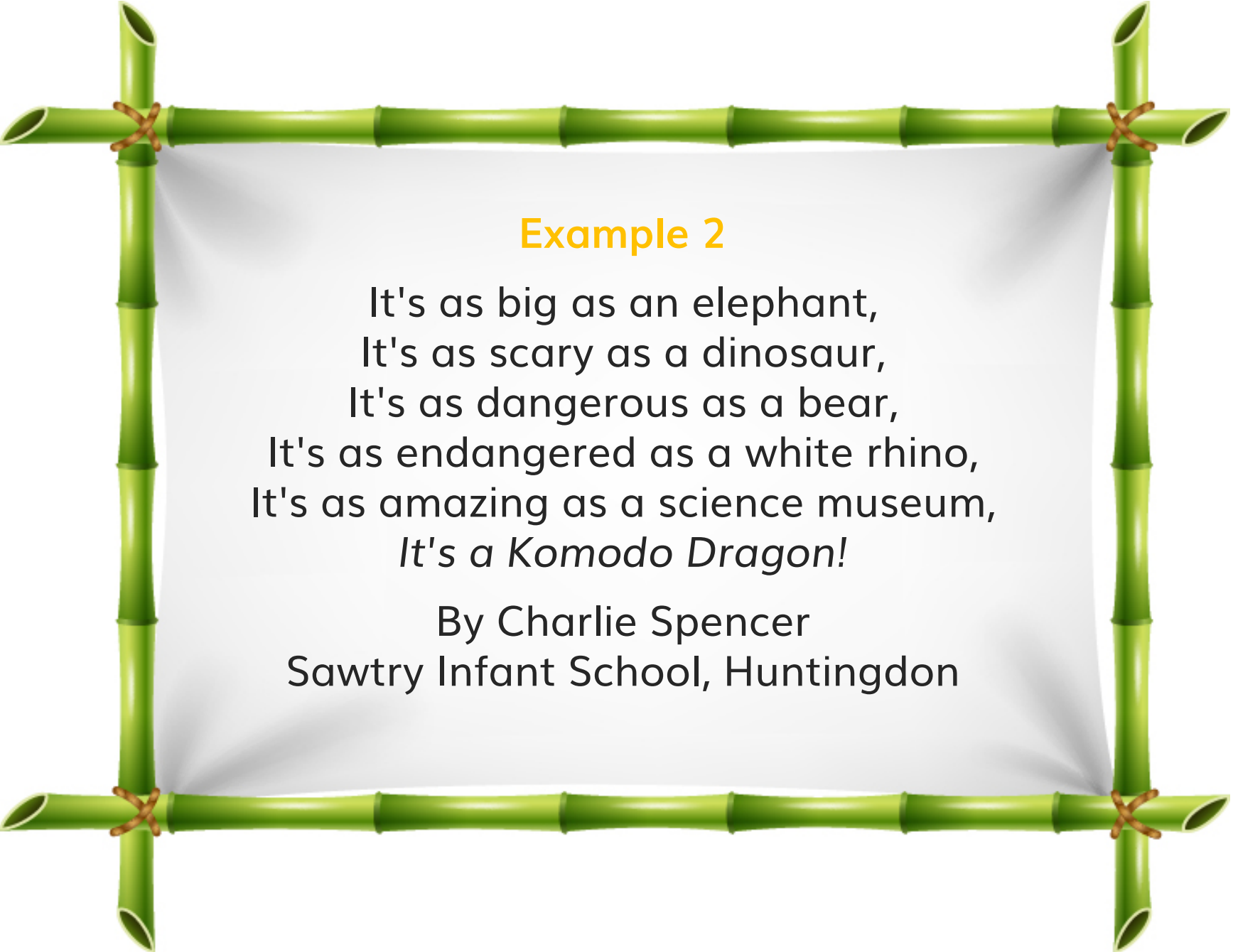
Here are some riddle examples to help

He is Sam, my cat!

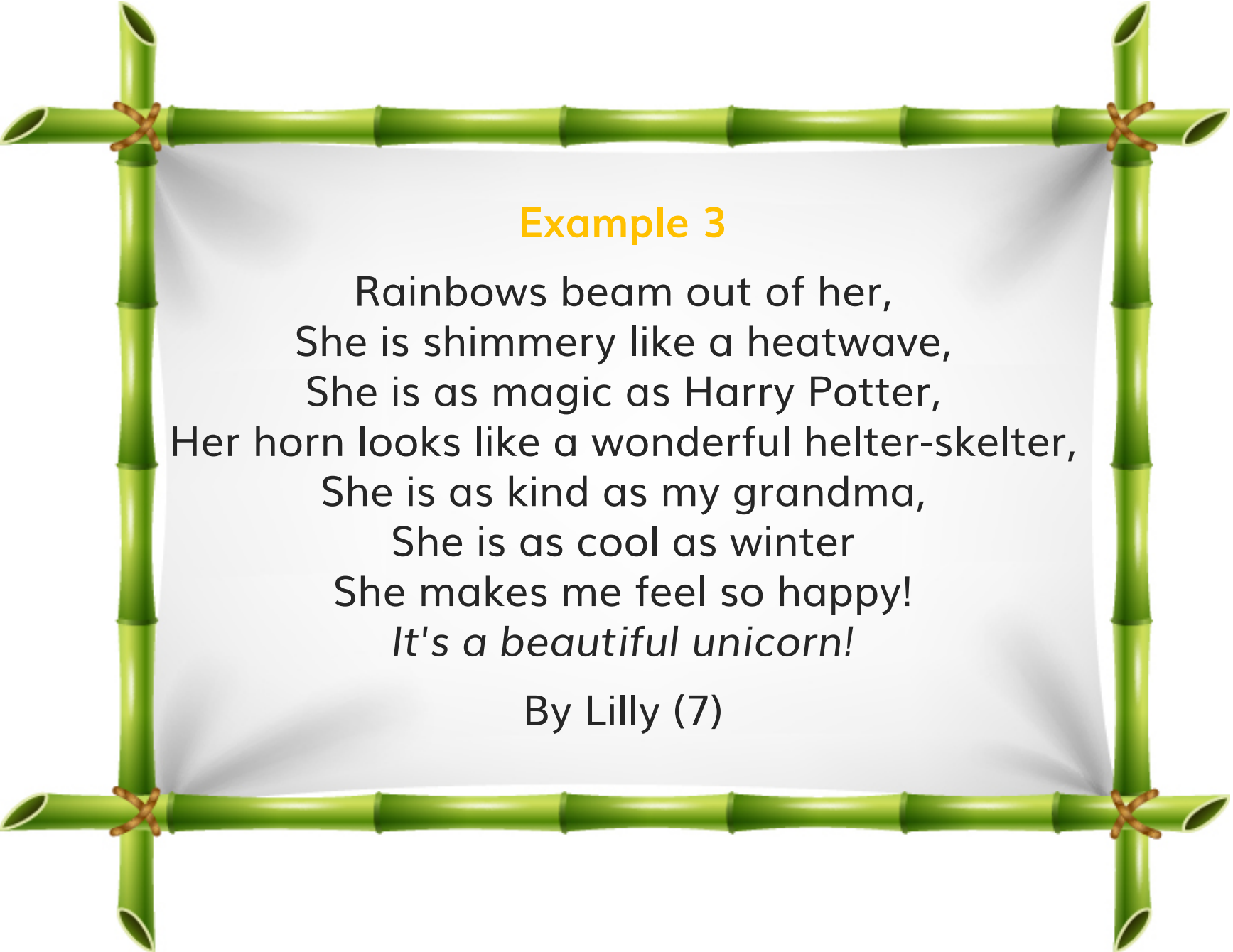

It's a Komodo Dragon!

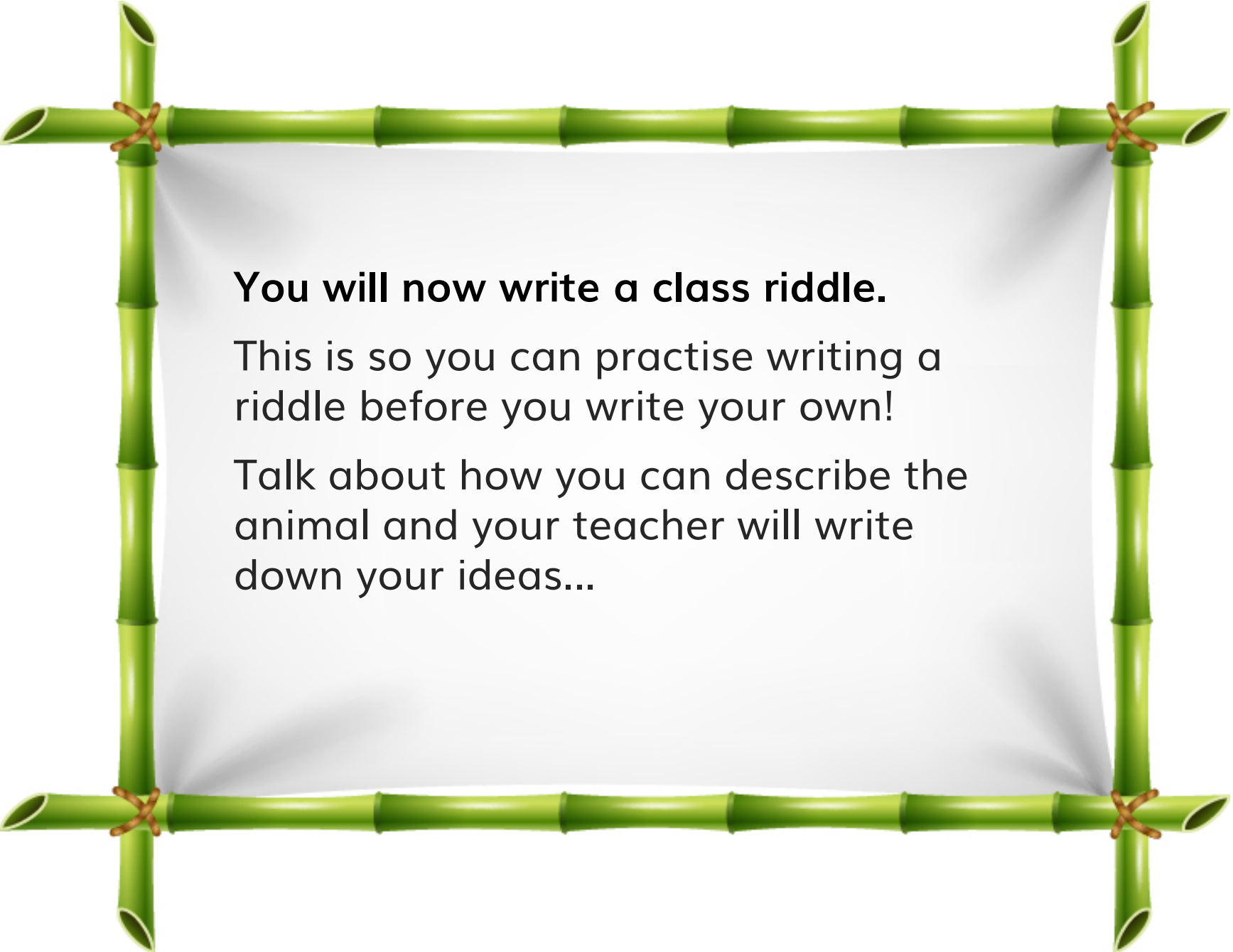
